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Potomac River – security zone

The Department of Energy (DOE) issued a notice stating that it received an application from Driftwood LNG, LLC seeking authorization to export domestically produced liquefied natural gas (LNG) by vessel from a proposed facility to be located in Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana. DOD - undersea communications link

The Department of Defense (DOD) issued a news release stating that DARPA is working on development of the Tactical Undersea Network Architecture (TUNA) program to improve undersea communications capability for US forces when traditional tactical networks are unavailable. The system would utilize neutrally buoyant high data rate secure fiber links connected to RF network node buoys. Senate - bill introduced re old vessel exemption

Senator McCaskill (D-MO) introduced a bill (S.89) to amend title 46, United States Code, to exempt old vessels that only operate within inland waterways from the fire-retardant materials requirement if the owners of such vessels make annual structural alterations to at least 10 percent of the areas of the vessels that are not constructed of fire-retardant materials and for other purposes. Official text of the bill is not yet available. (1/10/17).

Court – 'take nothing' verdict upheld

In an unpublished decision, the US Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit affirmed a 'take nothing' verdict in a seaman personal injury case for negligence and maintenance and cure. The appellate court found that the jury instructions were within the judge's discretion and that evidence of plaintiff's pre-employment injury was properly admitted. Bosarge v.
